INTRODUCTION

The origin and scope of this work, together with the reason for it, can be stated in a few words. I have always been interested in the investigation of my ancestral line. For a number of years the descendants of Henry Livergood and Salome Ruby Livergood have held family reunions in Taylorville or Decatur, Illinois. It was in this locality that the sons and daughter of Henry and Salome Livergood located after leaving the ancestral home near Lancaster, Pennsylvania. At one of these gatherings I was asked, on account of my interest in this line of work, to compile a family record of the descendants of Henry and Salome Livergood.

In the preparation of this record, I have received help from the various members of the family. Nellie, the wife of John Wesley Livergood of Stonington, Ill., and Mable, the wife of Arthur Livergood of Webster Grove, Mo., have been very helpful in collecting data that had been very confusing to me. Mrs. John Boylan of Eldora, Ia. and Mrs. Phoebe Earhart of Cedar Rapids, Ia. have contributed bits of information regarding early members of the family. Mrs. Earhart is the oldest member of this group now living. I must not forget the help and tolerance of my good husband, John.

Mr. L. L. Levegood, ~~46 Larch Ave*~~, Long Island, New York, has completed a very fine genealogy of the different branches of the family in the east, and with the aid of Charles J. Livingood, 2766 Baker Place, Cincinnati, Ohio, has compiled very interesting information of the family in Europe. He has placed these genealogies in various libraries in the United States. One is in the Historical Library in Des Moines, Ia. This library has a very fine genealogical department. He also sent one to the library in Springfield, Ill. near the homes of the pioneer Livergoods. Mr. Levegood is continuing his research in Pennsylvania and has discovered new material for a supplement to the work he has just completed.

This has been a labor of love and the fine letters received from cousins and their children and their children's children, many of whom I have never seen, was a happy experience that has paid me well for the time and energy spent on these records.

The following is an extract from the Genealogy by L. L. Levegood:

ORIGIN AND ANCESTRAL HOMES

"The Levegood-Levergood-Levengood-Livergood-Livingood (in German: Liebenguth; Leibenguth; Leibundgut) Family is of SWISS origin, the earliest records available, dating back to 1590, disclosing that our Swiss ancestors formerly resided in AARWANGEN, near Langenthal, in the Canton of Bern, Switzerland. They were German-speaking Lutherans. In the seventeenth century some of them migrated to German Alsace, where for 70 years they resided, among other places, in the small hamlet of SCHALKENDORF, 25 miles northwest of the city of Strassburg. In 1680 a great part of Alsace was seized by the French, and in 1689 a vast territory known as the Palatinate was desolated. In the years 1710 and 1733, they left their Fatherland to find a haven of protection in the Colony of William Penn.

"For centuries their homeland had been ravaged by wars, their cities and towns laid waste and their families scattered and destroyed. Religious persecution had reached such an acute stage that a large portion of the residents of the Palatinate turned their eyes toward the New World as their only means of succor.

"William Penn, whose mother was a German, offered religious freedom to all, and here the refugees found a land of peace, contentment and opportunity. These rugged pioneers, it is stated in the records, were the best farmers in the world, they having in many districts cultivated the soil for thirty generations. They possessed an indomitable capacity for industry, a keen wit, independence, and a high degree of intelligence. Their untiring energy and frugal habits rendered them particularly well equipped to perform the hazardous and strenuous work of felling the forests and reclaiming the soil, in a vast country that was then a dense wilderness, over-run with Indians and with wild animals of many descriptions.

"The original family name of what is now the LEVEGOOD-LEVERGOOD-LEVENGOOD-LIVERGOOD-LIVINGOOD Family was typically Teutonic: "Liebenguth", "Leibenguth" and "Leibungut", literally translated "Lovegood" or "Body and Goods", and spelled in the various records as "Liebenguth", and "Leibenguth", "Liebengut", "Lowengut" and "Leib-und-gut". The name was erroneously entered in the passenger lists of those early British sailing vessels as "Lebegood", "Leebegood", "Liebegood" and "Leebegoot" by the clerks of these vessels, and under such Anglicized phonetic form these immigrants took their oaths of allegiance to the British Government as citizens of the Province of Pennsylvania,

and in purchasing land and entering into other obligations in their newly-acquired homes they were obliged, of necessity, to continue such spelling, or a similar spelling, in order to conform with the original records on file in the landing port of Philadelphia."

From Rupp's History of Berks County, 1844:

"In 1717 we find in 'Colonial Records' of Pennsylvania - 'Large numbers of foreigners were coming from Germany, strangers to our language and constitution, the Council enacted - 'That every master of a vessel should report immigrants he brings to our country and they must take oath of allegiance within one month after their arrival, to see whether they are friends to our government'."

"Secretary of the Province, James Logan says, 'We have of late, great numbers of Palatines poured in upon us without recommendation or notice, which gives the country some uneasiness, for the foreigners do not so well among us as our own English people.'"

"DECLARATION SIGNED BY ARRIVALS FROM GERMANY:

As per decree of the Board of the Provincial Councell (Council), held at the Court-house at Philadelphia, Sept. 31, 1727:

(All male persons above the age of 16 to repeat and subscribe their names themselves or make their mark, to the following declaration:)

'We, subscribers, natives and late inhabitants of the Palatinate upon the Rhine and places adjacent, having transported ourselves and families into this Province of Pennsylvania a colony subject to the Crown of Great Britain, in hopes and expectation of finding a retreat and possible settlement therein do solemnly promise and engage, that we will be faithful and bear true allegiance to his present Majesty, King George the Second, and his successors, Kings of Great Britain, and will be faithful to the proprietors of this Province, and that we will demean ourselves peaceable to all his said Majesty's subjects, and strictly observe and conform to all the Laws of England and of this Province, to the utmost of our power and the best of our understanding.'

Mr. Charles J. Livingood, of Cincinnati, Ohio, has written a manuscript about the Livingood branch of the family, and from his manuscript I have taken a few excerpts about one of his trips to Europe with his family when he searched the records in Switzerland and found some very interesting facts about the family. This trip was taken in 1905 and 1906.

CREST

"At the time of that illuminating visit, I went to Bern, and found in the city directory a number of Leib-und-guts, and called upon the most prominent, a cloth merchant, Herr Oscar Leibundgut, who was so interested that he took me at once to his apartment, entertaining me delightfully. On the wall hung the family crest, which he says has been known for several hundred years, and gave me an imprint from his seal.

"On the shield, which is surmounted by a knight's casque, there is a lion rampant, holding in the right paw a bag of gold, while above all is a similar lion, and about the sides the usual flourishes. That lion might have caused some of our family to write the name 'Löwengut', meaning 'lion's share'. So I hunted up the heraldry office, where I was told that the crest, while ancient, had been revived and registered by Herr Oscar Leibundgut."

POSSIBLE DERIVATION OF THE FAMILY NAME:

"But I have a much more interesting origin of our name to disclose. Coming from the railroad station in Bern, one notices in the central square (Bubenbergrplatz) a small park, in which rises a handsome statue, surmounted by a figure in armour, Count Adrian von Budenberg, one of the heroes of Switzerland, almost as important as Winckelreid, who, next to the fabled William Tell, is perhaps the most important. There is a long inscription carved into the stone, and a phrase:

'MEIN LEIB UND GUT IST EUER EIGEN BIS ZUM TOD',

which strikes you right between the eyes. Doubtless it is what Bubenbergr said to his people:

'MY LIFE AND GOODS ARE YOUR VERY OWN UNTIL DEATH'.

"What is more natural than to suppose that this battle cry was given to us, Bubenbergr's retainers or followers, as a family name? And rather early too, for we found it in the records as far back as 1525. Bubenbergr fought for his fellow Swiss a century earlier."

The following is an extract from a letter from Lynne L. Levegood of New York City: (Oct. 8, 1936)

"Mr. L. Liebenguth, of No. 44 Pine Street, New York City, has written to me following an inquiry by me, that he was born in Mulhouse (Mulhaussen), Alsace, and that his Uncle, Henry Leibenguth, of Mulhouse, has probably the most complete records of the Liebenguths since the first one of them settled in Alsace in the early part of the 17th century.

"Mr. L. Liebenguth's ancestor, in direct line, was Hans Leib-und-Guth, born in Meichnaa, Canton of Bern, Switzerland. He settled in Meimsprung, near Mulhouse, Alsace, in the early part of the 17th century. One of his sons, Adam, was christened in the church of Mulhouse, Alsace, on August 29, 1643. Another son, Joannes Henrious, who headed Liebenguth's branch of the family, was christened in Mulhouse on April 15, 1649.

"Mr. Liebenguth states that the earliest record of the Leibenguth family is to be found in a book written by the Swiss Historian, Paul Kasser, about the history of the Castle of Aawangen, which was published in 1909. (Geschichte des Amtes und des Schlosses Aawangen). In this book, Hans and his brother Frederick Leib-und-Guth are prominently mentioned.

"The Leibenguth family is still very widely represented in the Canton of Bern, according to Mr. Liebenguth. He says that the first Leibenguth came to Alsace through the Swiss army in the 30-Years War. The names have been spelled from the oldest version, Leibenguth, Liebenguth, etc. 'My Great Grandfather, Pierre Liebenguth, was born in 1723, was the first of his line to spell the name "Liebenguth". Besides the Swiss family which still exists in the canton of Bern, there are today several Liebenguth families in Mulhouse (Mulhausen), some Leibenguths in Illzach, a small town in Alsace about 10 miles from Mulhouse.'

"The above seems to confirm in many details the results of the research conducted by Mr. Charles Livengood of Cincinnati."

The following is an extract from the Genealogy by Mr. Lynne L. Levegood of New York City:

FIRST AMERICAN SETTLEMENT

"Experienced as they were in the agricultural pursuits, these German refugees cleared vast acreages and settled many towns and cities in Southeastern Pennsylvania. One branch of the family arrived at the Port of New York about 1710, and the story of the trials and tribulations of that branch are contained in another paragraph of this genealogy. After the settlement of Gormantown, the early arrivals sought farms out in the open country, and the Liebenguth family, together with many others, purchased land in the territory about the headwaters of Perkiomen Creek, east of the present City of Pottstown, at New Hanover, now Montgomery County, Pa., the first recorded settlement of the Liebenguths, the records reciting the purchase of a "homestead and farm". The Falkner's Swamp settlement was at that time in what was Philadelphia County, Montgomery County not having been created until later years, the adjoining county, Perks, then extending diagonally across the Province of Pennsylvania to what is now the New York state line.

"The graveyard adjoining the Falkner's Reformed Church is really one of the "shrines" of the Levegood-Bevergood-Levengood-Livergood-Livingood Family, for here lie buried many of the original Liebenguths, their graves marked by ancient monuments engraved in old German lettering. Perhaps the oldest of these is the headstone in memory of ADAM LIEBENGUT, born in Alsace, Germany, in 1718, who died in 1804 at the age of 86 years, which monument also records the birth-place of the wife of Adam Liebengut, CHRISTINA. Adam Liebengut was a son of one of the earliest arrivals, ULRICH LIEBENGUTH, who with his wife SUSANNA and five minor children, including Adam, arrived in Philadelphia aboard the British sailing ship, "Charming Betsy" on October 12, 1733.

"A fortnight prior to that date, however, HANS LIEBENGUTH and his wife MARGARETHA, with three minor children, had arrived at Philadelphia aboard the Brigantine "Richard & Elizabeth".

"History relates, furthermore, that as far back as 1710 JACOB LOWENGUT, one of the ancestors of the family, had arrived at the Port of New York, and after many trials and disappointments in the none-too-friendly Province of New York, he with others cut their course through the forests along the Susquehanna, from their settlements in Schoharie County and at West Camp, north of Kingston, New York, to the mount of the Swatara, and then into the Tulpehocken district of Berks County, where they made their homes for a number of years, only to be finally scalped by the Indians, with his wife, other members being carried away into captivity. A son, Jacob, Jr., however, is reported to have escaped and settled in Southern Pennsylvania.

LATER SETTLEMENTS OF THE FAMILY

"Possessing a natural migratory tendency, more or less hereditary perhaps, the descendants of the Liebenguths, Leibenguths, Leibunguts and Lowenguts scattered in later years to many of the Counties of Pennsylvania, Berks, Lehigh, Lancaster, Northampton, York, Northumberland, Lycoming, Tioga, Cambria and elsewhere, in which sections many of the family still reside. The directories of the Cities of Philadelphia, Reading, Lancaster, Johnstown and Jersey Shore, among other cities and towns, contain the names of many of these descendants of the early pioneer families. Their forefathers were among those who felled the forests and opened up such settlements as the "Block House", now Liberty, Tioga County; Johnstown, in Cambria County, and various smaller communities in Lancaster, York and Berks Counties. Such towns as Birdsboro, Oley, Friedensburg, Elverson, Joanna Heights, Douglass, Pottstown and Royersford contain many of the Levengood and Livingood branches of the family; also the town of Womelsdorf and its vicinity, in

Berks County. Others are scattered in far-away centres, such as Shawnee, Oklahoma; Princeton, New Jersey; Elmira, N. Y.; Jersey Shore, Pa.; Brooklyn and Floral Park, on Long Island; Birmingham, Alabama, and in many towns in Wisconsin, Illinois and Iowa, where the "Middle-West Rivergools" reside."

WE ARE YOUR ANCESTORS

We are forgotten--but always present.

We are unknown--but inescapable.

EXPLANATION

I have tried to put this genealogy in as simple a form as possible, and I trust that with this short explanation you will be able to trace your ancestry.

The Roman numerals before the name designates the number of the generation that we are able to trace. Peter, being our oldest ancestor of whom we have actual record, is of the III generation. We then take his children, being generation IV. Henry, a son of Peter, is our next direct descendant. Henry's children are designated by arabic numerals, which numbers correspond to the number given them in the family Bible record on page 11. The large letters of the alphabet designate the next descendants and the small letters designate their descendants.

THE LIVERGOODS

To my knowledge, Mrs. Anna Harley Gilson of Pasadena, California, formerly of Iowa, was the first of the Livergoods to show an interest in the family history in a definite way. Some of us have a manuscript which she compiled of the Livergood family, which we greatly cherish. This manuscript states that our immigrant ancestor is Hans Jacob Liebenuth who sailed in 1733 for America. As I searched old records I could not find proof of this statement. Mrs. Gilson died some years ago, and I do not know her authority.

The second generation is the missing link to prove which immigrant we are descended from. Through wills of John Levergood and his wife, Christina Levergood, he mentions the names of his brothers and sister. They are John, Peter, Daniel, Catherine Baker, Jacob and Joseph. These names are not arranged according to age. His brother Peter is the grandfather of the Livergoods who migrated to Illinois just before the Civil War. I have the record of Peter, the Livergood and Levergood ancestor. If I can find out who is the father of this family, it seems as if I could soon locate the grandfather of Peter.

None of us know how we came by our name Livergood. Grandfather Henry Livergood of Lancaster is Levergood in this will, but in other papers he is Livergood. While on a visit in the east in 1931, my husband and I called on a relative and they were rather resentful of our change of name. The oldest member of our family in the west has no idea of how or when this change occurred. It must have been very early in grandfather's life.

There are a number of Livingoods in Iowa. A George Livingood of Woodbine, Iowa, a number of families in the eastern part of the state and also one at Eldora, Iowa.

LEIBENGUTH - LEVERGOOD - LIVERGOOD

- I. . . . First Generation of Immigrant Ancestor. In doubt.
- II. . . . Second Generation. In doubt.
- III. . . . Third Generation, John, Peter, Daniel, Catherine Baker, Jacob, Joseph.

- III. JOHN, and his wife, Christina, evidently had no children, as none are mentioned in his will made in 1805. His wife made her will in 1826. They were people of considerable means.
- III. JACOB, had a son, Joseph, and a daughter, Mary. Joseph had two sons, John and Daniel, and a daughter, Christina.
- III. CATHERINE, had one son, John Baker.
- III. DANIEL, no record.

(The above records may not be complete, as the names were found in a will.)

- III. PETER is the earliest ancestor of whom we have a definite record. Peter Lebegood, later Levergood, was probably born in Berks County, but settled in Hallam Township, York County, near Wrightsville, Pennsylvania, about 1780, where he spent most of his life farming. His last days were spent in retirement at Columbia, Pennsylvania. He was born September 15, 1755 and died May 15, 1825. He married Phoebe Yocum (Yocum or Yokum) who was born February 1, 1762 and who died December 19, 1819. She was of Swedish descent. The Yocum branch of the family would be interesting to trace. I am quite sure she is a descendant of Jonas Yocum who came to this country late in the 17th century and settled near Philadelphia. Peter and Phoebe are buried in the Columbia cemetery, just across the Susquehanna River from Wrightsville in Lancaster County. His second wife was Hanna Gardner, widow of Adam Litzenburger. His children, all by his first wife, were John, Peter, Jacob, Henry, and Polly.

He served in the Revolutionary War under Captain Kauffelts Company of Riflemen, 1st Battallion, York County Militia in 1777 and 1778, discharged September 21, 1791. (Pennsylvania Archives, Vol. 7, 5th series, Nat. No. 102693.) The York Riflemen was the first military company west of the Susquehanna to join the patriot army during the Revolutionary War. This company left York on July 1, 1775 and joined the army under Washington near Boston on July 25, 1775. Miss Eva White, Quemhoning Chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution and also Pennsylvania Society of Huguenots says, "The Germans in the Palatines and Alsace Lorraine were followers of Price Hugo, for that reason are eligible to join the Society of Huguenots."

- IV. JOHN, the eldest, went west when he was a young man and settled near St. Louis, Missouri. He married a Miss Hines and they left a daughter Maria, who married a Mr. Stump. Their daughter married a Mr. Tyler and lived in Oklahoma. One of the Tyler daughters was Hurley Tyler and married Tom Terry of Oklahoma City. (1910).

IV. PETER, the second son, settled in Johnstown, Penn. He was born in York Co. in 1785, died in Johnstown, Penn. on July 26, 1860. Married Susanne Rodfong, York Co., in 1807. She died in Johnstown in 1840. They moved to Johnstown in 1811. They had nine children: Catherine, who married John Benshoof, went west, settled on land near ~~Freeport~~, Ill. A number of their descendants are living in Alden, Iowa Falls and Lake Park, Ia; Lucinda, another daughter, married Jacob Meyers. They had three children: William, who has one daughter Virginia, who lives at Wheeling, W. Va. and married a man by the name of Dunn; Edward is unmarried; Virginia Susanne married Hugo Hoffbaur on July 9, 1859. I discovered by chance that their son, Louis, was living in Eagle Grove. His sister Lulu Hoffbaur Reinbrecht lives in St. Paul, Minn.

IV. JACOB, the third son, settled in Wrightsville, Penn. He was an extensive farmer of York Co. Their children are John Levergood, who married Louisa Schaffer; Carrie, who married a Mr. Wilson; William, a teacher in Philadelphia; Phoebe, who married a Dr. Polk of Philadelphia; Jacob P. of Wrightsville, who has a daughter Louise who is teaching in Wrightsville.

IV. POLLY. We have no data concerning her, further than she lived to womanhood and married.

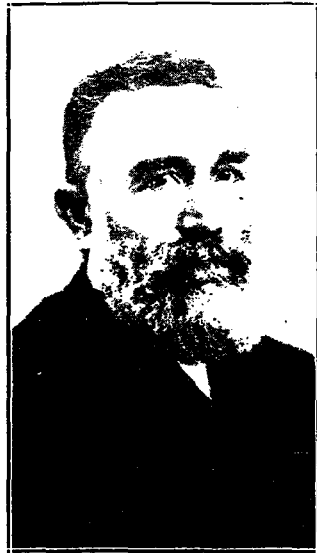
IV. HENRY, the fourth son of Peter, and the grandfather of the oldest generation now living in the west (1937). Born July 11, 1799, York Co. Penn. Died Dec. 17, 1840, Manor Twp., Lancaster Co., Penn. Married Salome Ruby Aug. 5, 1819. Salome Ruby was born Oct. 2, 1796, York Co., Penn. Died Aug. 21, 1852, Cumberland Co., Penn. They moved to Lancaster a few years after their marriage, possibly in 1821 or 1822. Henry died of "consumption". Some one told me that he caught cold while overseeing the building of a new home. The home was never completed by him or his heirs. His oldest son, George, was 17 years old at the time of his father's death. The mother died 12 years later of "lingering consumption". Henry owned the Livergood Mills 2 miles west of Lancaster City on the Columbia Pike, now known as the Lincoln Highway. He was a man of considerable wealth. Grandmother was living with her daughter Mary Livergood Hurley at the time of her death.



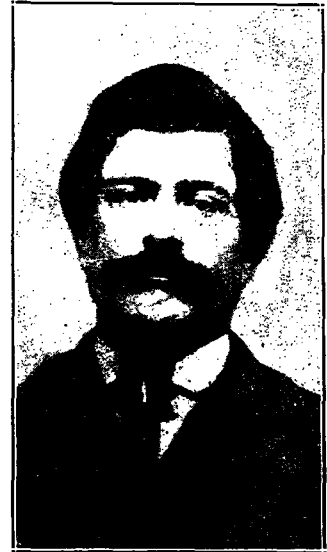

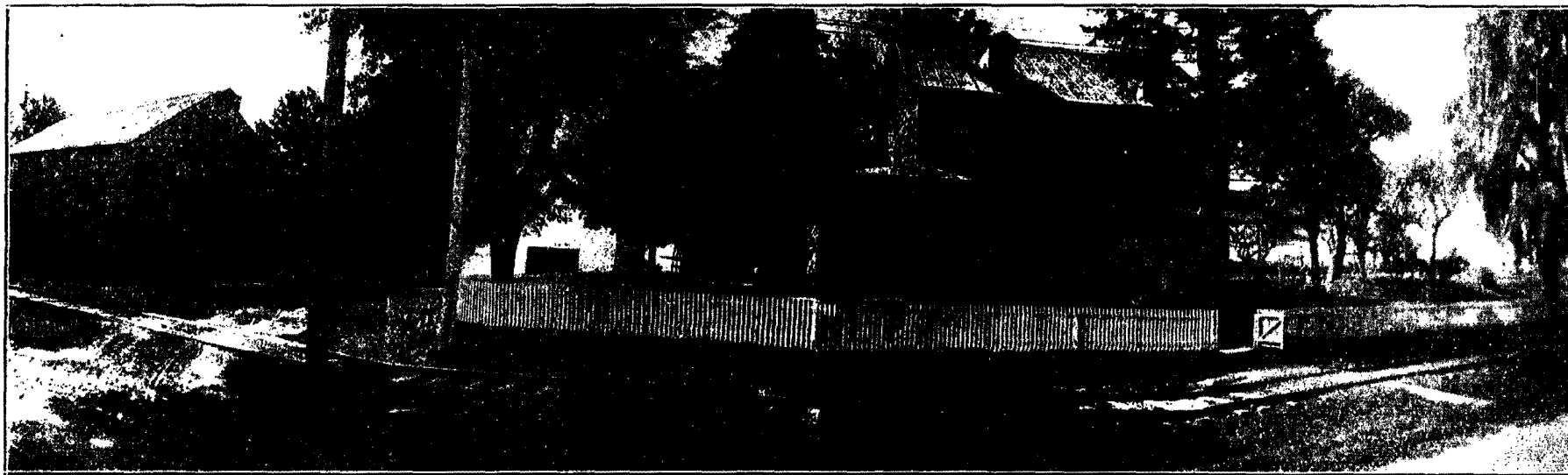

Mrs. Earhart's residence is Cedar Rapids, Iowa. She received her schooling in the Public Schools of Decatur, Ill. She began her work as a teacher in the country schools of Illinois. VI. (G) ISRAEL LIVERGOOD - (George, Henry, Peter). Born June 2, 1857. Married Etta Bowls on Sept. 28, 1887 at the Methodist Parsonage in Taylorville. A farmer. Owned a nice farm near Edinburg at the time of his death. Died July 16, 1929. He and his family were members of the Christian Church. Etta, his widow, resides in Taylorville. There are three children from this union.

"In the year 1884, I came west, and helped chase the rattlesnakes out of western Kansas, Osage Nation and northern Oklahoma. Preempted 160 acres in Western Kansas in 1886. During the years 1887, 1888 and 1889 worked on a cattle range in Osage Nation, Indian Territory. December 10, 1889, married Anna Ruf. Was in the famous race for claims when the Cherokee Strip was opened for settlement Sept. 16, 1893. Made the race on horseback; time, eight miles in 32 minutes. We, my wife, Anna, and I, are now living on the land secured at the opening of the Cherokee Strip. I am past 76 years old, and in fairly good health. I am a Mason, a life member of Newkirk Chapter, Royal Arch Mason and a Shriner. I am also a member of the Grange, a Methodist and a Republican. We have three sons and two daughters living, two sons and two daughters having passed away.

She married Richard Davis, who was born Dec. 4, 1863 in Clay Co., Ill. on Jan. 8, 1885 in Taylorville, Ill. They spent many years on a farm near Taylorville. They moved to Alamosa, Colo. in Oct., 1914. Mr. Davis is a Democrat. They are members of the Methodist Church. Elizabeth died June 15, 1917 in Alamosa. Their children were born in Taylorville.

(a) HOMER RICHARD DAVIS, born Oct. 28, 1885. Married Frances Robinson Oct. 24, 1907 in Decatur, Ill. Children: Richard Glenwood Davis, born Oct. 10, 1908; Aaron Delmar, born Sept. 25, 1910. Moved to Alamosa, Colo. in Oct., 1914.

Divorced in 1922. Married Claudia Dean Groves Nov. 2, 1924 in Walsenburg, Colo. She was a teacher and attended Colorado Western State College. No children from this marriage. Homer is a fireman on the Denver-Rio Grand and Western Railroad. A member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers and Independent Order of Odd Fellows. He is a Democrat and a Methodist.

Schuyler has some very interesting letters written by grandmother, Salome Livergood, to his father, George. She was anxious about the oldest son and his family who had located in the far west. Made inquiries about schools and churches. He also has in his possession one of the Old Mill ledgers. The mill was in the hands of George Livergood. Children:

- V. (4) HENRY CLAY LIVERGOOD - (Henry, Peter). (From "History of Christian Co., Ill." Published in 1880.) "Mr. Livergood, whose death occurred Nov. 29, 1878, was one of the substantial farmers of Stonington Township. He was born in York, Penn. in Lower Windsor Township, Oct. 8, 1825. His father was Henry Livergood, and his mother's name before marriage, Salome Ruby. He was the third of a large family of children. When he was a child his father moved to Lancaster County, Penn., and bought a mill now known as "Livergood's Mill", two miles west of Lancaster on the Columbia Pike. His father was a man of considerable wealth and gave his children a good education. The son, Henry, was principally raised in Lancaster County. He attended school at Lititz, Penn., and afterwards attended an academy at Abbyville. He learned the carpenter trade but never followed it.

"When about twenty, he left home and opened up a flour and feed store in the city of Lancaster. He carried on a wholesale and retail business and had a large trade. He was married in the city of Lancaster to Margaret Ober on Sept. 19, 1848. She was born in Lancaster on July 18, 1825. She was a daughter of Benjamin Ober. After his marriage, Mr. Livergood lived in Lancaster one year. He had been unfortunate in his business at Lancaster, and decided to move west. In the spring of 1850 he came to Sangamon County and engaged in farming in the neighborhood of Pleasant Plains on rented land. In 1863 he bought 120 acres of prairie land in Stonington Township without any improvements. He moved on this tract, improved it and was living on it at the time of his death. At the time of his death he owned 200 acres of land. Mr. and Mrs. Livergood had eight children: (A) Frances Salome, (B) Daniel Webster, (C) Peter, (D) Henry Ober, (E) Anna Margaret, (F) John Wesley, (G) Phoebe, and (H) Edmund. Mr. Livergood was a Republican in politics. He was a man of industry and was known as an honest and good citizen."

Livergood Mills, which are mentioned above, are located on what is now known as the Lincoln Highway.

Henry and wife, Margaret are buried in the little cemetery in Stonington. When they moved west, the boat on which they shipped their furniture sank to the bottom of the Ohio River. I understand that they recovered some of their goods.

VI. (B) DANIEL WEBSTER LIVERGOOD - (Henry, Henry, Peter). Born Dec. 10, 1854 at Lancaster, Penn. He died April 15, 1918 at the age of 64 years. He was married to Sarah McAnarney of Raymond, Ill. on Oct. 5, 1880. She was born June 16, 1855, and died Jan. 27, 1924. The father and mother are buried at Stonington and also a son, Harry. Anna is buried at Mt. Auburn, Ill. Eva and daughter, Ruby Ann, are in Calvary Cemetery, Springfield, Ill. Grace's baby, Carl Edward, is buried in Alon, Ill. The mother and children are of the Catholic faith. The father was raised a Methodist. Dan was a farmer. After his mother's death, he bought the old home where he lived until a few years before he died. There were eight children:

No. 1554, Dillon, Mont., K. P. Delta No. 15, Lima, Mont., O.R.C. No. 209, Pocatello, Idaho, First Chief Conductor, Chairman of local grievance committee and a member of state legislative committee of the O.R.C. Div. 411. Elected to these offices in 1912.

Married Christina Teenhaaf in Dubuque, Ia. on Feb. 22, 1897. They have 4 children:

V. (8). DANIEL WEBSTER LIVERGOOD - (Henry, Peter). Born Nov. 23, 1834, Manor Twp., Lancaster Co., Penn. Came west when a young man, married Arvilla (?). Peter Livergood's daughter, Arvilla, was a name-sake of Webster's wife. He was a Lietenant, Co. I, 2nd Calif. Volunteers, Owen's River Expedition, Owens, Calif. He resented being sent to Calif. A number of letters he wrote to his sister Mary are in the possession of her daughter Alice Hurley Boylan. He was shot by Sergeant Hudson of his own company in April, 1865. Sergeant Hudson was tried and court ~~marshalled~~. Someone told me that he was shot the day Lincoln died (April 15th). His wife wrote his sister Mary that he lived several days after being shot. The letter stated he died at Camp Bidwell on Sunday night, but the date of the letter was not legible, so actual date of death is not known. He was buried at Chico, Calif., but his remains were later moved to Visalia, Calif. There were no children. He attended school in Lancaster. They belonged to the Independent Order of Good Templars.

V. (9). SILAS LIVERGOOD - (Henry, Peter). Born Aug. 31, 1836, Manor Twp., Lancaster Co., Penn. (The following is contributed by S. R. Livergood, Wilton No. Dak.)
 "Father attended Shippensburg and Whithall Academies, Harrisburg, Penn. Came west to Decatur when he was 21 years old. He made his home with his sister, and his brother, George, for a few years. He helped Uncle Henry haul lumber and supplies from Springfield to the spot where he built his first home in the west near Stonington, Ill. When the news of the election of Lincoln reached Springfield, a cannon was fired. Father was breaking prairie 8 miles out in the country with 2 four-yoke ox-teams. He stopped his work, left his teams in charge of the hired man, and walked to Springfield. I have heard father say he was the only eye-witness to a murder case, a stabbing affray in a drug store, tried by Lincoln.

"Some years during the early part of the Civil War father owned a livery barn in Decatur. I have heard him tell of having several horses stolen by soldiers home on furlough. A few years before he was married he lived with Uncle George on a farm about 20 miles northwest of Decatur, in what was then called Belle Praire. It was here that he met mother who had come west to live with her uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. Chapin. While farming with his brother, he bought 500 contraband United States army mules at one time.

"Father and mother lived in Decatur, then moved to Newberg, an inland town near Argenta. He owned a general store while living here. Later, moving to Decatur, he sold lightning rods and pumps, etc. Moved to Iowa in the summer of 1883. In later years he was in the insurance business. He lived on a farm near Ackley, Ia. for four years, then moved to Iowa Falls where he lived until he died. He was reared as a Lutheran, but after he grew to manhood united with the First Christian Church of Decatur, Ill. A staunch Republican." Children:

Notes gleaned from Mrs. Alice Hurley Boylan:

"Mother, when visiting her Uncle, Peter Levergood of Johnstown, was told he built one house in Johnstown every year, and up to that time had built forty houses. He made generous contributions to the church and built the parsonage. In his honor, the church choir sang "Old Hundred" each Sunday as long as he lived. One of his daughters married a Benshoof. He located this daughter and her husband and each of his grandchildren on one quarter section of land near Freeport, Ill. He gave a gold watch to each of the wives of his sons. He was one of the commissioners that built the dam at Johnstown."

"Henry Livergood, our ancestor, was one of the directors of a bank in Lancaster. The directors built a dam (I do not know if it was the one at the old home or not) and it damaged Henry Livergood's property. He sued the bank and won his case. He received damages of \$30,000.00. "Jimmy" Buchanan (ex-president) was his lawyer and his good friend and neighbor. The old Buchanan place adjoined the old home on the east at that time."

Extract from will of John Levergood, brother of Peter Levergood, our ancestor. This will was made May 16, 1805. Filed in Register's office Aug. 12, 1805. He signed his name in German - Johannus Liebungut. There evidently were no children as only brothers, sisters and wife were mentioned.

"I give and bequeath to Joseph Levergood, son of Jacob Levergood the sum of fifty pounds to be paid to him one year after my decease. Item, I give and bequeath to Mary, daughter of Jacob, the sum of fifty pounds, to be paid to her one year after my decease. Item, I give and bequeath to John, Daniel, Christina, sons and daughter of Joseph Levergood, the sum of twenty-five pounds each one year after my decease, to be put out at interest till they come of age by my executors. And the remainder of my personal property to be equally divided, share and share alike as followeth. One fourth part to my brother Peter and one fourth part to my brother Daniel and one fourth part to my sister Catherine Baker and one fourth part to my brother Jacob's children to be paid one year after my decease equal, alike. * * * *

"I do hereby make, and appoint my beloved friends to be executors of this my last will and testament. * * * *"

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Extract from will of Christina, wife of John Levergood, Amity Township, the County of Berks, State of Pennsylvania, widow, May 17, 1826.

"First, I give and bequeath and dispose to Nicholas Yocum, son of John Yocum, the sum of one thousand dollars and I give and bequeath to Moses Yocum, son of John Yocum one thousand dollars and I give and bequeath to Mary Rhoads, daughter of John Yocum the sum of one thousand dollars. I give and bequeath to Hannah Yocum, daughter of John Yocum one thousand dollars and I give and bequeath to Susannah Wallas, daughter of John Yocum two hundred dollars and I give and bequeath to Daniel Yocum, son of Moses Yocum one thousand dollars and I give and bequeath to Mary Fritz, daughter of Moses Yocum one thousand dollars and I give and bequeath to Hannah Weaver, daughter of Moses Yocum one thousand dollars and I give and bequeath to Jacob Levergood, son of Peter one hundred dollars. * * * "

Executors: John Yocum, Daniel Yocum and Moses Yocum.

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Extracts from the manuscript of Charles J. Livingood concerning papers his father possessed:

"These very important papers, real, crinkly, oily sheepskin parchment, are in my safe deposit box, given me by my father, who doubtless held them as a lawyer interested in genealogy for the family. They are most difficult to decipher, being written in old German, longhand, but the ink has not even yet faded. They run as follows:

"(1) January 2, 1669, Ulrich Krimmer to Hanz Leibenguth, 'burgher from Schalknedorf'.

"(2) October 25, 1673, Weyland and Schweiderisch to Hanz Leibenguth.

"(3) September 13, 1687, one Alberth to Peter Liebenguth, 'burgher zu Schalkendorf.'

"(4) January 12, 1692, Hans Leibenguth to Hans Peter Leibenguth, 'his beloved brother, a bachelor'.

"(5) January 3, 1695, one Wallner to Hans Peter Löwenguth, a bachelor.

"(6) June 14, 1700, one Schecken to Hans Peter Löwenguth, burgher zu Schalkendorf, and his wife Margaretha,

"(7) January 23, 1724, Hanz Feith to Jacob Löwenguth."

"All these were for small tracts, many of them vineyards, probably long, narrow strips running up the hill, as they are platted even today, and they perpetuate a custom of the early Roman settlers. This gives Alsace that appearance of a great truck garden, with no fences, no one daring to despoil his neighbor's crops.

"Nowadays, while we preserve our deeds, the best proof of ownership lies in the recorder's office at the county-seat court-house. But in the old days, as in England, deeds were carefully preserved, even after the owner had divested himself of the property, and an exact copy thereof deposited in some archive, both original and copy being made by the same hand on one sheet of parchment, and then cut apart, leaving the indented, wriggling line so that the two can easily be matched."
