#### FOREWORD

The information contained in this volume has been gathered from many and varied sources. More than fifteen thousand vital record entries in the six New England states have been collected and compiled. Abstracts of hundreds of probate records and registries of deeds in eighteen counties have been prepared. Inscriptions in scores of cemeteries have provided many additional facts. An extensive correspondence with hundreds of descendants in every part of the country has enabled the compiler to tie into the family many migratory branches which otherwise would never have been located. Use has been made of the records available at the Federal Census Bureau and the Congressional Library at Washington. Thousands of family genealogies, town histories and general reference volumes in libraries throughout the entire East have been consulted. Some have supplied a single item; others, several paragraphs of information.

Although every precaution has been taken to assure a maximum of accuracy and every effort has been made to complete all McIntire lines of descent, the author does not in any wise infer that this volume is infallible and much less that it is complete. He trusts that any error that may have crept in will be

judged as leniently as may be.
In this volume it has been the author's intention to complete the records of McIntire daughters only in the first generation, since obviously a more complete history of their descendants properly belongs in genealogies of their respective family names. This has necessarily meant the omission of much material that


has been compiled.

The author is indebted to a countless number of descendants who have furnished a wealth of material about their respective family units. It would be impossible to name them all. Acknowledgment, however, should be made to Mrs. Samuel R. Putnam of Claremont, N. H., who has generously contributed many records which she has gathered, and who has furnished the map of Scotland and the family coat-of-arms.

Finally, the author is especially indebted to his father, Harry J. McIntire, without whose indefatigable interest and invaluable assistance it would have been impossible to complete this volume

HISTORICAL LANDMARKS OF THE MACINTYRE CLAN IN SCOTLAND

#### MACINTYRE CLAN HISTORY

ARMS—Quart 1 and 4; Or, an eagle displayed gules; 2: Argent, a galley, her sails furled sable, flags gules; 3: Argent, a hand holding a cross-crosslet fitchée sable.

CREST-A dexter hand holding a dagger in pale proper.

CLAN PIPE MUSIC—Gabhaidh sinn an rathad mor. [We will take the highway]. BADGE—Fraoch gorm [Common heather].

The MacIntyre arms are quartered. The original family arms. which appear in the upper left and are repeated in the lower right, consist of a red spread eagle on a gold background and indicate service in the foreign wars. The designs in the upper right and lower left are arms of the MacDonalds of Sleat and the Campbells of Breadalbane and were acquired through marriages of MacIntyre chiefs to heiresses of these families. Their background throughout is silver. The galley, black with red flags, indicates service in Spanish Armada campaigns. The design in the lower left and the cross-crosslet fitchée are sable and, consequently, indicative of a Crusader. The esquire's helmet above the escutcheon indicates the rank of the owner. It is surrounded by a mantlet or lamberquin in the original metal and color of the MacIntyre, red and gold. The torse, a wreath of entwined ribbon, surmounts the helmet and is a relic of the tournaments of the fourteenth century. The crest, a "dexter [right] hand holding a dagger in pale [perpendicularly] proper [in natural colors], pays tribute to the early ancestor who severed with a dirk the thumb on his left hand to fill a hole in the side of his vessel.

The traditional history of the MacIntyre Clan indicates that they are probably a sept of the MacDonalds of Sleat, Skye. This theory gains support by the fact that the MacIntyres have always made use of the MacDonald badge, the heather.

A romantic legend suggests that on one occasion the MacDonald chief's galley sprang a dangerous leak. Without other means to stop it, a clansman forced his thumb into the hole and cut it off with his dirk so that he might be at liberty to assist in the work of sailing the vessel. By this drastic expedient he saved the crew from drowning and was henceforth called Saor na h-ordaig, the Thumb Carpenter.

Another explanation which is equally fantastic if not quite so heroic suggests that two brothers of the MacDonald Clan quarreled over the ownership of an island. It was agreed that each row out to the island and that the first to touch it should become its owner. One brother realizing that he was losing the

race drew his knife, cut off a left finger, and tossed it upon the shore whereupon his brother "cursed him long and loud and deep."

The tradition adds that a son of the original thumb wright became known as Mac-an-t-saoir, the Carpenter's Son. Resolving to seek his fortune elsewhere he departed from Sleat in his galley taking with him his revered white cow and vowing that he would settle wherever she would first lie down to rest after landing. This she did at Glenoe near Bunawe in the district of Lorne, a place still known as Larach na Ba Baine, the Site of the White Cow.\*

From this point the history of the Clan is well documented. It is a certainty that the MacIntyres of Glenoe occupied these lands from 1300 until 1806 and served as Hereditary Foresters of the Stewarts and Campbells, Lords of Lorne. The tenure by which they held Glenoe from the Campbells of Glenorchy was a payment annually in summer of a snow ball and a white fatted calf. The snow ball was easily obtained at Cruachan.† As they always kept several white cows, a white fatted calf was readily procurable. Each year it was delivered at a stone called Clach an Laoigh Bhiadhta, the Stone of the Fatted Calf.

This arrangement continued until the beginning of the eighteenth century when the tenant of Glenoe unfortunately agreed to the payment being commuted into money. In time this rent was increased to such a large sum that the MacIntyres were unable to meet their payments and in 1806 were obliged to

leave their hereditary home.

There was a large colony of MacIntyres resident for many generations at the village of Cladish, Loch Awe, where they carried on an extensive weaving industry. A specialty with them was the production of very finely woven hose and garters which were made in the various clan tartans. No Highland costume, however expensive, was complete at that period without a pair of Cladish garters. There were MacIntyres in Badenoch who were attached to the Clan Chattan, while others of the clan in the district of Rannoch in Perthshire were famous for centuries as musicians and from 1680 were the hereditary pipers to Chiefs of the Clan Menzies.

The MacIntyres of Glenoe have, however, been the clan's chiefs. After Donald, a doctor, succeeded to the chiefship of

<sup>\*</sup> A legend which has survived for generations suggests that during Montrose's invasion of Argyll in 1644, Alaster MacColkeitach with his brigade marched through Glence. In the belief that he was still among his traditional enemies, the Campbells, he ordered that all the houses be destroyed. The absent chief's dwelling which was roofed with heather was the first to be consigned to the flames. A burning coal was brought from the heather and thrust deep into the thatch, but before the fire had made progress Alaster was informed that it was the home of the Chief of the MacIntyres. "Then forbear," he exclaimed, "and extinguish the flames, for it is the house of our blood." The coal, it might be added, was extracted from the roof and, as a relie to prove the respect paid by a Sostman to the traditionary ties of kindred, was carefully preserved by the MacIntyres for many generations.

the clan, he went in 1783 to New York. His oldest son, James, who was born two years later at Newburgh, sailed to Scotland in 1806, married Ann Campbell of Corries, Glenorchy, in 1817, returned to the United States in 1822, and settled on a farm in Fulton County, N. Y. His grandson, James, born at Fonda, N. Y., January, 1864, is the last known chieftain of the clan.

Most celebrated of all of the clansmen was Duncan Ban MacIntyre, the Gaelic poet of the eighteenth century who ranks next to Ossian as the bard of the Gaelic race. He was born of poor parents at Druimliaghart in Glenorchy in 1724, fought as a Hanoverian at Falkirk in 1746, and served as a private in a Highland fencible regiment until it was disbanded in 1799.\* Although he was unable to write or to speak English and received no formal education, he excelled in every kind of verse. It has been said that he could repeat in Gaelic all of his works was published in Edinburgh in 1887, seventy-five years after his death.

Most of the MacIntyres migrated to America during the great Scotch migrations of the eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries and settled along the entire Atlantic seaboard from Nova Scotia to Georgia. There is still, however, a Clan MacIntyre Society in Scotland with headquarters at Glasgow.

<sup>\*</sup> He was imprisoned when he "gave voice to a strenuous indignation" to an act which forbade use of the traditional Highland garb. Thirty-five years later when the act was repealed he "burst forth in joyous strain" with his Song of the Breeches. "No longer are Scotsmen obliged to blush when in the presence of the fair." he exclaimed, "and now the men of the hills appear again in their loved tartans, the coat with the strife of colors; gracefully stream our belted plaids, our hose reach not the knee. nor hinder the step."

#### THE McINTIRE GARRISON HOUSE

During the troublesome days of the Pequot and King Philip's Wars, New England men often found it necessary to provide definite places of refuge for the women and children during the frequent Indian attacks. Such retreats came to be known as blockhouses or garrisons.

It appears that the settlers of York had neglected to provide any such collective defense during the first Indian assaults and that it was not until the attack of 1689 that garrisons were used. At the time of the Candlemas Day massacre of 1692 there were probably four such blockhouses in that area. By an act of 1706 all persons in York were required to "abide" in such garrisons as were allowed by the governor. Fines were imposed for disobedience.

The structure now known as the McIntire Garrison House was mentioned in the records as early as 1692, at which time it was located on land owned by Alexander Maxwell.\* By 1707 it was referred to as Maxwell's Garrison, but in 1709 was known as Scotland Garrison. Although it was not converted into a garrison until late in the century, it had possibly been built as early as 1640 or 1645. Authorities have referred to it as the oldest house extant in Maine and the oldest log cabin in the country. Some have contended that Maxwell was its builder; others, that it was constructed by Micum McIntire.† The records indicate, however, that in his last illness Maxwell conveyed the Garrison House to John McIntire, Micum's oldest son. There is no deed which records its transfer, although on June 27, 1707, a short time before his death, Maxwell sold for fourteen pounds three acres of his homestead to John. This property adjoined the McIntire home lot and was bounded by "the orchard or garden of said Maxwell where the Garrison now stands."


With its "dove-tailed and trunnelled rough-hewn timber, caulked seams and loop holes for musketry" the McIntire Garrison House is typical of colonial garrisons which stretched along the entire New England frontier. Its second floor projects on all sides. Openings in the "overhang" permitted the beleaguered defenders to pour scalding water or molten lead upon

<sup>\*</sup> Alexander Maxwell, who was in York in 1657, was the first Scottish prisoner to settle in the Scotland district of York.

<sup>†</sup> Boston Evening Transcript, June 22, 1935. If, however, it was built as early as 1645, it is impossible that either Micum McIntire or Alexander Maxwell was its builder, since neither reached the colonies until 1651. Representative Citierus of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts has even credited Micum's son John with having built the garrison. This is obviously incorrect as John was not born until several decades after its erection.

any invaders who might attempt to fire its foundations.\* Through sliding panel "sights" and portholes in the attic sentries were able to watch for the approach of hostile Indians and to make effective use of firearms with a reasonable protection.

Much of the furniture and many of the cooking utensils still contained in the house were, it is supposed, brought over from Scotland. One of the most curious of the relics is the "Pound Stone."† Tradition recalls that as Micum's young wife was about to embark for America she picked it up on the shore and packed it with her belongings since, as she supposedly explained, "There may be neither scales nor weights for me to measure my butter and my cheese in that savage land."

The Garrison House has passed down in unbroken heritage from John McIntire to his great-great-great-grandson of the same name.

This scheme was not original to the colonists and appears to be as old as European warfare itself.

#### **EXPLANATIONS**

Every effort has been made to simplify the arrangement of the genealogical facts which are presented in this volume, however a word of explanation may be helpful. The marginal numbers which precede the names of some of the children indicate that more extended accounts of these descendants appear later in the records. The small exponents are generation numbers.

## DESCENDANTS OF MICUM McINTIRE OF YORK, MAINE

After he had defeated the English Royalists, beheaded King Charles, and turned a rebellious Ireland "into a bloody shambles," Oliver Cromwell with an army of fifteen thousand men proceeded to the conquest of Scotland, the last kingdom remaining loval to the Stuarts. Many of his men were seasoned veterans of the Irish Campaign; a third were mounted troops. Leading his "fanatical Croppies" he reached Edinburgh after several minor skirmishes and marched on to Dunbar, a town on the east coast of Scotland at the mouth of the Firth of Forth. David Leslie in command of the Scottish troops, by encamping upon the heights of Lammermoor above the town and seizing Cockburnspath, cut off any possible English land retreat to Durham and Berwick-on-Tweed. Leslie was aware that while his troops out-numbered Cromwell's forces they were untrained Clansmen and had little hope of winning any major encounter with their trained opponents. He cautiously proposed to retain his own unassailable position and to starve out the trapped English. When he was informed by the zealous Presbyterian preachers who had "wrestled with the Lord in prayer night and day and finally had assurance in a 'revelation' that the Lord of Hosts would deliver Agag [Cromwell] into their hands." Leslie abandoned his caution and on Sept. 3, 1650, marched his army down the hillside. Within an hour the English had slain three thousand Scots and had taken ten thousand prisoners. About half of the prisoners were so exhausted by their flight and disabled by their wounds that they were released.

At least three of the MacIntyre Clan,\* Micum, Philip and Robert, were among the prisoners taken by Cromwell and at his command deported to America. A number of authorities have contended that they were of the same family, possibly brothers.† While there is no documentary proof to support such a belief, neither is there any to refute it.

Philip settled at Reading, Mass., where he died at an advanced age in December, 1719.‡ Robert, as a witness in a trial in the

Although the members of the Clan in Scotland still retain the original MacIntyre spelling of the surname, descendants of Micum have almost invariably used the Americanized McIntire. To avoid confusion this spelling has been used consistently for all of his descendants.

<sup>†</sup> Eaton in his Annals of Warren, Me., stated that Mieum was one of seven brothers who were transported to different parts of America by order of Cromwell. This suggestion was also made by Josiah S. McIntire in an article which appeared in the Biddeford (Me.) Journal of Jan. 12, 1892. This allusion to the mystical seven is probably unfounded.

A genealogy comprising over three thousand descendants of Philip McIntire has been compiled by the author of this volume. Publication will be undertaken about 1942.

Essex (Mass.) Court, Nov. 24, 1653, stated that he was twentyfour years of age and was employed at the Lynn Iron Works. It seems probable that he went with his employers to Rhode Island where the foundry was removed a few years later.

A romantic legend which has survived the centuries recalls Micum's heroic escape from what appeared to be a certain death. The Cathedral of Durham into which the Dunbar prisoners were confined proved to be too small to house the five thousand captives. From both a sanitary and a political standpoint it soon became necessary to reduce their number, and within a few days of the battle the Council at London ordered that all officers and every tenth private should be shot and such of the remainder who were "well and sound and free from wounds" banished from the realm, distributed throughout the colonies, and bound into a seven years' compulsory service. Micum discovered that he was a tenth man and about to be selected for the sacrifice. "With a superhuman effort he burst his bonds," broke ranks, and attempted to escape. The tradition suggests that while he was pursued and wounded by a mounted officer his display of courage so pleased his captors that his sentence was commuted to exile. He is said to have packed all of his possessions in a small wooden box,\* whereupon he was placed aboard the good ship Unity which on Nov. 11, 1650, set sail for the colonies.†

He was taken to Dover, N. H., where he served his seven years and was taxed as "Micome, the Scotchman." He received on Dec. 11, 1662, a grant in the Newichawannock River region and found employment in the mill at Salmon Falls, then part of Kittery. A few years later he removed to York, settled on land adjoining Alexander Maxwell, and engaged in fishing and farming. In 1668, the town granted him land on the southwest side of the river and in 1670, he bought forty-two acres of "upland and meadow land" from John Pierce.

† In all, 150 Scotch prisoners were taken in the Unity to New England. John Becx of London who was interested primarily in the Saugus iron mines had financed their transportation. Col. Charles E. Banks has written: "The Unity buffeted the tempestuous, wintery sens of the Atlantic, and as it usually took six weeks to cross in favorable seasons, she could not have made Boston harbor before the end of December. They suffered from scurvy on the voyage, but how many died is not known. The prisoners remaining, after sixty were sent to Lynn, were sold to purchasers willing to pay the price and were distributed to numerous towns in Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and Maine. The prevailing quotation was between twenty and thirty pounds for each man, which was received for their transportation." A year later the Scots under the youthful Charles II, whom they had proclaimed as their king, resolved to invade England. Cromwell learning of the Scots advance proceeded to Worcester where the Covenanters had encamped. On Sept. 3, 1651, a year to the day after the "Race of Dunbar," he surrounded the town and after a fierce five-hour engagement virtually annihilated the Scots. Thousands of Highlanders fell in battle. Subsequently 272 of the prisoners were shipped to Boston in Holanders fell in battle. Subsequently 272 of the prisoners were shipped to Boston in Holanders and sold into slavery. sold into slavery.

Obviously his name was originally Malcolm, the English version of the Gaelic Calum. Micum is probably as near as the untutored town clerks could interpret his broad pronunciation of his own name.

Micum had as a neighbor a distant cousin, Alexander Mc-Eneer.\* By tradition McEneer at the point of death sent for his kinsman and said, "Micum, I am dying and am grieved to leave my wife without protection in this wild country. It is no fit place for a woman without a husband or brother, so I bequeath her and all my land and property to you, if you will take them and do fairly by each." Micum appears to have assented to this extraordinary request, for following McEneer's death in 1670 he married as his "inherited wife" McEneer's young widow.†

It was the custom in colonial days for the men to leave their farms on Saturday afternoons and to meet at a central place for "converse, congratulation, and jollification." On one occasion the men of Scotland parish and those from other quarters of the town had flocked to the trading center of York and "got up a spree." The Preble Family, which has recounted the incident, suggests that: "In due time the Scotland people started for home somewhat excited by liberal potations and fit subjects for a row. Riding on together, jostling against each other, playing off their tricks, accompanied by coarse jokes, they at length got into a grand mêlée. And to work they went. The McIntire is a peaceable, well-disposed fellow if you do not chafe him too much, but beware how you start the Scotch blood. Tradition has handed down an account of this battle. Epic poets of the day described the combat. One of the stanzas runs thus:—

And there was Micum McIntire With his great foot and hand, He kicked and cuffed Sam Treathy so He could neither go or stand."

Micum is undoubtedly the Mathan Macintyre who on May 7, 1667, was a bondsman in an Act of Separation involving William Gowin and Elizabeth Frost.;

Alexander McEneer, a Dunbar prisoner, was in York as early as 1662. On June 12, 1666, he and his wife were charged with "not comeing to the publique meeteing on the Lord's days about five weeks." He was examined and the court "finds him unable to come soe constantly by reason of his weakeness & lameness & upon promise of his care to come to meeteing for tyme to come is acquitted." On Jan. 22, 1667, McEneer lodged a complaint against Alexander Maxwell for "strikeing and abuseing of the said Mathanere to the drawing of blood contrary to his Majestys peace & laws established in this province." The presiding magistrates "upon examination of the Case both partys being present" decreed "by the blood drawn, James Grant's testimony, & Maxwell's own confession, that hee stroke the said Mathanere & drew blood of him, for which Wee fine im 3s, 4d. & to pay the charges unto the Constable." They then ordered that "Alexander Maxell & Allex Mathanere for preventing further mischeefe between them shall bee both bound to their good behaviour. In his bond Maxwell was committed to "good behaviour towards all his Majestys subjects, espetially towards Allexander Mathaneere." John Fierce, McEneer's father-in-law, was McEneer's surety.

<sup>2</sup> Elizabeth Frost was the mother of an illegitimate child by Gowin. After providing for the child's maintenance and ordering that Elizabeth "by committing hooredome with the said Gowin shall forthwith either receive 12 stripes at the poast or forfett the some of six pounds to the King," the court "for preventing of future mischarges of uncleanness which hitherto have been two apparently manifest," ordered that William and Elizabeth "shall not be found frequently or unseasonably together." Micum, as a surely, signed a bond of forty pounds that "said Gowin performe & truely fulfill this Act of Separation."

On Sept. 11, 1677, he was bonded as administrator of the estate of John Carmichael\* and directed to "render a true accompt of your doings when called thereunto by lawfull authority." April 7, 1697, he made an agreement with John Braceyt to divide the real estate of their father-in-law, John Pierce.

Three years later, Apr. 17, 1700. Micum made his will:

In the Name of God Amen: The last will and testament of Micom Mecantire, I being in my usual health and right mind and sound judgment.

First, I give my soul to God that gave it.

Secondly, I give my body to the earth to be decently buried by my three sons, John, Daniel, and Micom, and as for the good things of this world that God hath bestowed upon me I give and dispose of as followeth.

Thirdly, I give to my son John Mecantire all my homestead both housing Intraly, I give to my son John Mecantire all my homestead both nousing and land and fencing. Likewise I give to him twenty acres of wood land, which was granted to me by the town on this side the river and lyeth by the way yt goeth to Newichawonick, and also I give to him twenty acres of land on the other side of the river of York out of my three score that I have there of that land I had of Micannive [McEneer] and my father Pierce, and also I give to him one third part of that land of mine at the partings or thereabouts above the Minister's Creek.

Fourthly, I give to my son Daniel Mecantire all that land I had of John Carmeale, which lyeth near Arthur Bragdon Junior's, also I give to him twenty acres of land on the other side of York River adjoining to Micom's land my son, also I give to him one third part of that land at the partings or thereabouts above the Minister's Creek.

Fifthly, I give to my son Micom Mecantire all my lands at Bass Cove that I had of my father Pierce. Also I give to him twenty acres of land on the other side York River adjoining to Daniel my son's land. And also I give to him one third part of that land of mine at the partings or thereabouts above the Minister's Creek.

Sixthly, my will is that my marsh or meadow both salt and fresh be equally divided between my three sons, John, Daniel, and Micom, as and at the discretion of my overseers of this my will.

Seventhly, my will is that all my stock of cattle or creatures be equally divided between my three sons above said as my overseers shall see good.

Eighthly, I give to my son John his choyce of my iron pots and also his choyce of my three pair of plow irons.

Ninthly, I give to my son Daniel the next choyce of my pots and plow irons.

Tenthly, I give to my son Micom the other iron pot and plow irons, and as for the rest of my household goods to be equally divided between my three sons as my overseers shall see good.

A Scottish prisoner who following his term of servitude settled at York about 1660.

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This agreement, in full, may be found in Maine Historical and Genealogical Recorder, Vol. 3, pp. 235-56. John Pierce, a fisherman, came to York in 1653 and received a grant of land on George's Neck bordering on Bass Cove. Shortly after 1662 he married as his second wife Mrs. Phebe Nash, widow of Isaac Nash. John and Phebe were killed in the massacre on Candlemas Day, Jan. 24, 1692, when some tifty inhabitants of York were slain by the Indians.

Eleventhly, my will is that if either of my sons die without an heir lawfully begotten of his body that all his lands shall fall to the survivors of my children.

Twelfthly, my will is that neither of my sons shall sell or dispose of any lands or meadows any way except that seventy acres at the partings or above the Minister's Creek. It is to be understood that thirty acres of this seventy lyeth near my marsh and the other forty I had of my father Pierce. This is the land that is equally divided between my three sons above spoken of.

Thirteenthly, my will is that if my son shall go away (I mean my son John) from me before my death and not help me in carrying on my business, that he shall have but an equal share with his brothers of all my estate both real and personal. The overseers shall be paid for their trouble out of the estate.

Lastly, my will is that my true and trusty friends Mr. Samuel Donnell Esq. and Mr. James Plaisted both of York shall be my overseers of this my will to see that right and justice be done between my children. In witness whereof and for confirmation of all and singular the premises I have hereunto set my hand and seal this seventeenth day of April anno Domini one thousand seven hundred and in the twelfth year of his majesty's reign, King of England.\*

The will was probated Oct. 2, 1705, and administration was granted to his sons John and Micum. The inventory was returned by the appraisers, Nov. 8, 1705. The estate, valued at 199 pounds, consisted of "house and barn & homestead with twenty acres of woodland, his wearing clothes and house hold goods. forty acres of land about the parting of ye river, thirty acres of land and four acres marsh, sixty acres of land upon southwest side of yo river, seven acres of swamp marsh, fifty acres of land that lyeth at yo Salmon Falls, six oxen, five cows, three calves, thirteen sheep, six swine, eight loads of hay, and thirty-five bushels of grain."

By his father's will John McIntire received in 1705 the family homestead and first "choyce of my iron pots and my three

pair of plow irons." He was warned, however, that if he went "away from me before my death and [did] not help me in carrying on my business," he was to receive "but an equal share with his brothers."

He appears to have bought from Alexander Maxwell the building which has since become known as the Micum McIntire Garrison House. In the final division of public lands in York on June 20, 1732, he was granted eight shares by the town, the

maximum allowed any inhabitant.

His will dated Sept. 24, 1757, "in the 31 year of his Majesty's Reign"\* was drawn up "to prevent trouble and dispute among such of my children as may survive me concerning such worldly estate wherein it hath or shall please God to bless me in this life." To his son John he gave a plot of land "meadows and marsh, both salt and fresh, which is situate and lying on the southwest side of the southwest branch of York River"† and a half of his pew in the second parish meeting house. He bequeathed to Ebenezer "all my lands whereon he now lives containing fifty acres," his wearing apparel, and an additional three acres of marsh land. To Daniel was given sixty-eight acres of land. Samuel, although the youngest son, was appointed an executor of the estate and was given the McIntire homestead, additional land bequests, "all my utensils of husbandry both wood and iron, and half my seat or pew in the meeting house." After referring to dowries which he had given to them at the time of their marriage, he gave to his daughters Susanna Main and Hannah Junkins "all my household stuff of every kind within doors and all my quick stock to be equally divided between them." They received in addition "twenty pounds lawful money" apiece and a legacy which their deceased mother had been given by her father, Rowland Young.

The will was presented for probate at York, Jan. 6, 1772. In their final account the executors itemized as expenses incidental to the funeral "the digging of the grave," and the purchase

of "gloves, mourning weeds and a handkerchief."

3 MICUM<sup>2</sup> McINTIRE, son of Micum McIntire, died abt. 1755, married at York, Me., July 9, 1708, Jane Grant of Berwick, Me., dau. of William Grant.

In 1726, the selectmen of York requested the services of a "moving schoolmaster" to teach in the more important of the outlying communities. Although their petition was finally adopted, it did not meet with the approval of the men from Scotland parish. Micum McIntire was one of the fourteen dissenters.

Like his brother John, Micum received in 1732 the maximum grant of eight shares in the final distribution of public lands in York.

He drew up his will Oct. 21, 1743. After resigning "my soul unto my blessed Redeemer Jesus Christ on the account of whose merits alone I humbly hope for eternal happiness and salvation," he directed that he be buried "in a decent and Christian-like manner nothing doubting but at the General Resurrection Ishall receive my body again by the mighty power of God and in hopes of a joyful Resurrection to everlasting felicity and happiness." As for "such worldly estate as God in His Infinite Mercy has bestowed upon me in this life," he bequeathed to his wife Jane one-third of his real estate and a half of his "moveables." To his "only and well beloved daughter Keziah" he gave 150 pounds in addition to an equal amount which he had already given to her. The remainder of the estate including "the whole of my widow's third after her decease" was given to his son Alexander.

Capt. John McIntire, a merchant and ship builder, received in 1732 three shares of public land in York. In his will dated July 25, 1776 and probated Mar. 19, 1785, he made bequests to his daughter Elizabeth and to the children of his deceased daughters Susanna and Abigail, gave to his daughter Dorcas "seventy pounds, a good feather bed, bedding, furniture, and one good cow," and divided the remainder of his estate among his four sons. He directed that his "servant woman named Dinah, who hath been a faithful servant, shall be set at liberty and be free from any further servitude."

By his will of May 8, 1794, Ebenezer McIntire gave six shillings to his son John, thirty pounds to his son Ebenezer, "half a dozen chairs" to his daughter Susanna, and the remainder of his estate to his son Tobias. He directed, however, that "my grand-daughter Mercy, daughter of my son John, be allowed the use and improvement of any part of my dwelling house and the privilege of keeping one cow and two sheep on my farm so long as she remains single." This bequest was made "in consideration of her waiting upon and attending me during my natural life."

Built in 1820 on the side of Ossipee Mountain by Josiah Swett and his son William, it had be dragged twenty-five miles to Durrell's Bridge at Arundel for its launching. Noah Thompson provided one of the fifty yoke of oven and one of the sleds which were used and, as a volunteer teamster, went along on the three-day trek to the sea. For years the vessel engaged in the West Indies trade carrying cargoes which consisted principally of rum, molusees and tobacco.

It has been said that Sarah Came was "sent up to Boston to school" and that she was an expert needleworker having made the baptismal dress which was worn by the infants of the parish when they were presented for baptism.

Alexander McIntire was among the proprietors of the York commons in 1732 when he received a grant of six shares. In

Magdalen was taken captive by the Indians at the time of the Candlemas Day Massacre of Jan. 24, 1692, was carried to Canada, and after an absence of nearly four years was returned by an exchange of prisoners in Oct., 1695, Her husband, Nathaniel Adams, had been killed in the massacre. A few months after her return she married Elias Weare, who was slain by the Indians between York Harbor and Cape Neddick while returning from the evening subbath service, Aug. 10, 1707.

1737 and again in 1748 he is referred to in the records as a surveyor, but it seems probable that he continued in this work much longer.

In 1750, he served on a committee which supervised the last major division of public lands in York and in 1770, on another which was appointed "to take into consideration and report to the town at their next May meeting what they think proper for the town to do with relation to the Great Bridge over York River."

It appears possible that Mr. McIntire may have served during the French and Indian War with the British forces that took Louisburg in the Cape Breton campaign of 1763.

In his will dated Sept. 10, 1779,\* he gave a cow to his daughter Dorothy, "a three-year old heifer come spring, and half of all the pewter, pots and kettles" to his daughter Mary, his wearing apparel, largest desk, "the improvement of three-quarters of my salt marsh and thatch-beds, one half of my pew, and all my grindstone with the gear" to his son Alexander, one dollar and half of the family pew to son Micum, and a cow, a bed and bedding, and a third of the household goods to daughter Keziah. The clothing which had belonged to his mother and to his wife he divided between Keziah and Mary.

To his grand-daughter Sarah, daughter of his son Alexander, "because of the care and respect she hath shewn to me in sickness and health for seven years past and for her dutiful obedience to me," he gave "a bed and bedding, a pewter platter, six pewter plattes, a pair of handirons, a skillet, a round table, a pot, six chairs, my buckles, a looking glass," and the use of one-fourth of his real estate. He directed his executor, Maj. Jonathan Nowell, to "sell my sixty acres of land I have at laboring vain to purchase boards to fence the lands I have given to Sarah."

His son Micum presented a claim against the estate for "keeping and nursing Dinah, a negro servant of the deceased, for thirteen weeks."

When Alexander McIntire's will was presented for probate, Feb. 12, 1788, Samuel Blaisdell and Dummer Blaisdell, two of the witnesses, admitted that they "well remembered their signing and seeing each other sign," but had not seen the testator sign the instrument. They explained that they "were young and did not know any better, that Alexander McIntire brought the said instrument to them when they were at work in the salt marsh, told them it was his last will and testament, and desired them to sign the same as witnesses." Subsequent to this testimony the judge of probate "utterly disallowed and disapproved" the will. On Nov. 9, 1788, Alexander McIntire protested to the court that when the will had been disallowed on Feb. 12 he had been "absent at a place called Poughkeepsie in the State of New York" and filed an appeal to have the decree altered. He never followed up his appeal however, and in 1790, his brother Micuum, the administrator of the estate, had the "decree of disapproval" reaffirmed.

"Whereas difficulties have arisen respecting the settlement and division of the personal estate of Samuel McIntire," an agreement was made by the heirs, Apr. 10, 1815.

captain of his vessel delayed his departure so that the ship was frozen in and the crew was forced to subsist on such food as could be obtained on hunting expeditions. Once John Mc-Intire narrowly escaped death when he was attacked by a polar bear. On a later voyage to the Sandwich Islands he was put in command of a company of men and sent to rescue two shipmates who had been captured by cunnibals. He, too, was taken but escaped death when the chief of the tribe decided that he was "too lean to eat." In 1833 his ship was taken over by Commodore Perry and used as a supply ship during his expedition to open the ports of Japan. Later at Honolulu Mr. MeIntire read a religious tract in the seaman's bethel, was converted and returned to the United States to become a Methodist Episcopal minister. As a member of the Oregon Conference, he served churches at Hubbard, Sheridan, Amity, Grants Pass, Carlton, North Yamhill, Cornelius and Lafayette. He married Nov. 12, 1861, EMMA SEVERANCE, bon at Biddeford, Me., July 6, 1845; died at Salem, Ore., June 23, 1914. Rev. McIntire died at Lafayette, Ore., June 2, 1902.

Ebenezer McIntire enlisted as a private in Capt. Johnson Moulton's "Company of Minute Men of the Province of Massachusetts Bay" which marched in response to the alarm of Apr. 19, 1775. The following year he served as ensign in Capt. Jedediah Goodwin's Company. When the company was discharged at Albany, N. Y., Nov. 30, 1776, "280 miles was allowed the said McIntire." He was one of a group of York men "raised for the term of eight months to fill deficiencies in quota of men which had been raised to serve for three years. On June 15, 1778, he reached Fishkill and joined Col. Nixon's Regiment.

Following the war he returned to York, but about 1795, moved west into New Hampshire and took up land at Tuftonboro. He died intestate about 1814. A detailed inventory was presented in settling the estate. Among the possessions appraised were: an old wooden clock, a set of cart wheels, hoops and boxes, an old gun, a wool coverlet, an old tin roaster, a pine chest, feather bed weights, a blue and brown all-wool coverslip, a piece of bed quilt, three bed blankets, a thirty-year old loom, a small trunk, a kettle bail, two wash tubs, a flat iron, two calico gowns and a weaver's sleigh.

Jeremiah McIntire was commissioned as a second lieutenant in Capt. Thomas Bragdon's Company of Massachusetts Militia, June 25, 1776. The following year he served under Lt. Col. Joseph Storer in the Battalion raised to reinforce the Northern Army.

For many years subsequent to the war he served as deacon in the Second Congregational Church and "has been remembered as a kindly, gentle old man." Although he remained unmarried until he was over fifty years of age, he finally "wedded a neighbor girl who was over twenty-five years his junior" and became the father of ten children.†

In his will, Nov. 30, 1813, he provided an annual gift to each of his four daughters of five bushels both of corn and of barley, fifty pounds of pork, and an equal amount of beef "so long as they remain unmarried." He directed that they be allowed the "use of the great chamber, one-quarter part of the cellar, one cow to be kept on the place, and firewood suffi-

Micum McIntire in his will dated at York, Dec. 27, 1811, gave to his wife Rhoda in addition to her right of dower "two cows, six sheep, and a quarter-part of the household furniture." - The following account is taken from a feature article which appeared in the Boston Suaday Globe, Nov. 19, 1899: "For the past quarter of a century no more familiar sight has been known to the citizens of Saco and Biddeford than 'Pro' George S. McInure with his little tin pail and his arm full of books. Almost any afternoon he may be seen sumtering slowly along the main thoroughfare or crouched in some hallway, upon some doorstep, in the highways or byways, absorbed in the one great work of his life, mathematics. His career represents a life thoroughly wrapt up in figures, those dry, abstract things, so cold, palpable, and undeniable.
  "He remained on the farm doing little else than pondering and figuring until he was well along in years. Once he ran away from home and secured a job in a cotton mill. For a time he pushed a shovel and hoe for a farmer in Buxton. When his parents died, he went to Biddeford, but soon a thought of visiting the uttermost parts of the country came over him and without apparent purpose he went to New York and took steerage passage by the Nicaragua route to San Francisco. On the Pacific coast he led a nomadic life. On one occasion a wealthy gentleman impressed with his mathematical Inlents dropped the munificent sum of \$1.50 into his hands, which amount, George asys, is the largest sum of money he ever had given him in his life. He returned from California by way of the lathmus in 1856 and has since remained studiously within the precincts of Saco and Biddeford. "He declares that he likes mathematics well enough to go without his natural food. Not twenty warm meals has he eaten in as many years; for over twenty years he has not known for a single night the comfort of a bed. He occupies a small room over a store, a sort of gable-end apartment, and sleepe on an old blanket thrown upon the floor. Many a haymow in various barns has known his slumbering presence at night. For years he has subsisted upon milk, bread, and fruit, which he purchases or begs in small countover a

At the early age of seventeen he enlisted as a Continental soldier in the Second Massachusetts Line and served in Capt. Adam Bailey's Company from May 2, 1782 to June 1784. Of his twenty-six months service in the Revolutionary Army, fourteen were as a private in Col. Hull's Congress Regiment at the close of hostilities.

As a young man of twenty-five he migrated to Lancaster with a yoke of oxen, a logging chain, an axe and a bushel of salt as his entire capital of worldly goods. He took up land on the north side of Mount Pleasant and with these few resources at his disposal set to work at once to carve a home out of the forest.

He signed a petition drawn up by Lancaster inhabitants, Nov. 22, 1791, requesting a separation from Grafton County and the formation of a new county.‡ In 1803, he gave notice that he had "cast his lot with the Baptists."

<sup>\*</sup> Emmons Stockwell was in the company which was sent from Crown Point to convey provisions to the mouth of the upper Ammonoosue River for the relief of Rogers' Rangers on their return from their famous raid upon the Indian village of St. Francs in 1756. He went on an expedition with David Page to the Upper Coss in the autumn of 1763, blazed a fifty mile trail from Haverhill to Lancaster, and the following year married his companion's eighteen-year old sixter who had arrived after a three hundred mile trip from Petersham, Mass., and was the "first white woman to set foot in Lancaster." They were obliged to ride to distant Walpole, N. H., to find someone authorized to solimize a marriage. It has been said that his wife. Ruth (Page) Stockwell, often received in her husband's absence "sudden and unannounced calls from roving bands of Indians who would call for food or to warm themselves beside her hearth." We are told that "if they insisted on remaining through the night, she allowed them to do so, but required them to give up to be rail their weapons which she returned to them when they were ready to leave."

<sup>†</sup> Historians have contended that "no other man at any time in the history of Lancaster has ever exerted so powerful an influence on the town as did Gen, Edwards Bucknam." He kept the first stock of goods for barter among the settlers, surveyed their lands, became "clerk to the proprietors," served as a scout when Indians threatened the peace of the settlement, built the first road which permitted passage of loaded teams from Haverhill, became one of the most expert moose-hunters in the region, carried on an extensive fur trade with the Indians and served as Brigadier-General of the Sixth Brigade.

The petition contended that they lived sixty miles from Haverhill, the nearest shire town, and that the roads were "exceeding had and at some seasons of the year impassable." It was not until 1803, however, that their request was granted through the formation of Cooe County.

John McIntire's sixteen children were almost without exception paragons of longevity. Their combined ages were well in excess of a thousand years. At least nine are known to have reached the eighty-year mark, while all sixteen lived to marry.

As they neared the coast of Maine, a terrific gale blew up and the bark finally sank with thirteen aboard. Nothing which would indicate where the vessel capsized was ever found, and for almost sixty years the details surrounding its disappearance remained a complete mystery. In 1930, however, a water-tight metal receptacle containing the ship's sailing papers was washed ashore at Old Orchard Beach, Me. Mariners have observed that since the Mary E. Libby's owners carried part of her cargo of coal between decks and did not install needed "shifting boards," the crew fought a losing battle against the lashing gale. They have conjectured that the bark sank to a depth of possibly six hundred feet and that only gradually were the iron

spikes that fastened the deck planks corroded, and the deck beams loosened. Alexander McIntire held virtually every public office in the gift of the town. He was a justice of the peace, village selectman, town clerk of York, judge of the county court, collector of customs, representative to the state legislature and state senator.

In 1811, he was one of the seven incorporators of a cotton mill which was built below the outlet of Chase's Pond at York. He was one of five men chosen Mar. 16, 1813, "to examine the cannon belonging to the town to see whether they are good and sufficient and worth putting carriages to and also to make application to the proper authority of the state or United States government for aid in protecting York Harbor from the assaults of the enemy." The Universalist Society, which offered "a new doctrine of an all-embracing, liberal type and sought salva-

tion for all mankind," was formed at York about 1823. Alexander McIntire was selected as clerk of the group.

Mr. McIntire wrote May 4, 1850: "I am not quite seventyseven years old, but was able on the fourth of March last to travel on foot seven miles out in one hour and fifty minutes and returned in two hours and five minutes, the traveling being rough and hard." The object of this journey was to take the declaration of an o'd pensioner eighteen years his senior.

Mrs. McIntire was adjudged to be insane, Oct. 4, 1852. Subsequently she was a pauper and as late as 1870, was an inmate at the York almshouse.

Following his graduation from Dartmouth College in 1809, Rufus McIntire read law in Alfred with Hon. John Holmes until his admission to the York County Bar in 1812. He was commissioned as a captain in the United States Third Artillery at the beginning of the War of 1812, raised a company of over a hundred men, and served throughout the war on the frontier of New York.

In 1817, he removed to Parsonsfield and began the practice of law. He was a member of the state legislature in 1820, prosecuting attorney of York County from 1820 to 1843, and a member of the Maine Boundary Commission of 1820. As a Jacksonian Democrat, he was elected to the Twentieth Congress of the United States to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Hon. William Burleigh\* and was subsequently reelected to the Twenty-first, Twenty-second and Twenty-third Congresses. In all, he served at Washington from Sept. 10, 1827 to Mar. 3, 1835. As the Democratic candidate for governor of Maine, he was defeated in the state elections of 1837.

Mr. McIntire was appointed state land agent in 1839 when the controversy with England respecting our Northeastern boundary was at its height.† The Maine legislature, meeting in secret session on Jan. 24, 1839, authorized Rufus McIntire "to employ a sufficient force to arrest, detain and imprison all persons found trespassing on the territory of the state as founded

by the treaty of 1783." The armed posse reached the Aroostook region on Feb. 12 and encamped at the mouth of little Madawaska. To effect a peaceful solution of the problem a meeting between Rufus McIntire and the Canadian agent was arranged at the home of a Mr. Fitzherbert some four miles from the posse's encampment. During the night an armed force of about fifty of the trespassers surrounded Fitzherbert's house and captured Mr. McIntire and his assistants. They were taken by horsesleds into New Brunswick, carried to Woodstock where warrants were issued against them, and committed to the jail at Fredericton.

We are told that "the intelligence of this outrage upon the authority of the state created an intense excitement." Gov. Fairfield demanded that General Harvey release Mr. McIntire.\* The state legislature on Feb. 20 appropriated the sum of \$800,000 to protect its citizens and the public lands. The following day the governor ordered the mobilization of a detachment of over ten thousand officers and men. The boundary controversy was amicably settled, however, by a treaty negotiated by Daniel Webster and Lord Ashburnton in 1842.

By an appointment of President James K. Polk, Rufus Mc-Intire served as state marshal in 1845. During the four-year period from Apr. 13, 1853 to Apr. 1, 1857, he served as surveyor of customs of the port of Portland, Me.
